Relationship Between Time of Day and Image Characteristics Near Sunset

In 2003 I made this image (Dogtown at Sunrise) of the Richmond skyline from the NE tip of Belle Isle on the James River, using transparency film. It was in December not long after sunrise one morning. After starting up our website in 2009, this image was added, and has received many hits.




I migrated to digital in 2004 but I am still trying to get good images of the Richmond skyline. This quest of mine started with an attempt to make a similar image with my digital equipment and several years experience working with digital images. So on December 27th 2013 I headed out to Belle Isle just before 4 PM. with my Canon 5D Mark III and a couple of lenses - the Canon 24-105mm f/4 IS, and Canon 24mm TS-E f/3.5 II. Another objective was to record the relationship between time of day and image characteristics as sunset approaches and night takes over. OK, I know that sunset is not sunrise, but the effect is really about the same for this shot



The tree I got behind to take the 2003 image was still there. So I started with the 24mm tilt-shift lens, but not shifted or tilted. Sunrise that day was right about 5 PM. The first shot was taken at 3:50 PM (TS24-1). Actually 3 images were taken 2 stops apart and processed to HDR in Photomatix, using setting that look natural. The light on the buildings indicated that I needed to wait awhile to get an effect similar to the 2003 image. I made a few other images over the next half hour but they were not very different over that time range.

At 4:39 PM I tried a set of 6 vertical shots with the 24 mm TS-E lens and made a panorama out of that



At 4:51, only 4 minutes before sunset, I took a single shot with the 24-105mm at a focal length of 45mm (24-105-

1). The buildings are a little larger and the light was so red it made the whole skyline brick red. That was reflected in the water as well. Note that this shot was only 2 minutes after the one before. To get the best daylight color in the shot this is the best time - about 4-5 minutes before sunset. It only lasts a couple of minutes at most, maybe less. So during that time




period, take shot after shot!

So at that point my quest to make an image comparable to the 2003 image (or maybe better) was complete. But I became more interested in the effect of time of day than in my original objective, so I continued to shoot.

After that I moved away from the tree and took numerous single shots while the light was fading, but during that

period the light from the sky made the buildings dull. It wasn't until 5:29 that the next good period began. For about 8-10 minutes, or between 5:29 and 5:36, the bright western sky lit up the buildings while the artificial lights became brighter relative to the light from the sky overhead. The next image (24-105-2) was made at 5:34 PM. This is a wide angle shot (24 mm) that captures the very long reflections in the more calm water at the very

tip of the island. It's a



nice image, and a good time for this kind of shot. Very different from the prime time shot just before sunset though.

The final shot (24-105-3), again with the 24-105mm lens, was made at 5:41 PM. The focal length was 40mm, which made the buildings large in the frame and really showed the colorful reflections well. As the sky deepens to a very dark blue, the colors get brighter. These are mostly due to the artificial Christmas lights, and there is very little color in the western sky to light up the building faces. Again, this type of light

makes a very good image under these conditions. It's another good one for the collection.

For all this work I used PhotoshopCC, 64 bit, which I recently installed at home. For the HDR work I used Photomatix 4.2.7, 64 bit, and Adobe BridgeCC, 64 bit. This version of Photomatix is different from previous versions, and easier to use. For the panoramas I used PhotoshopCC and Photomerge. I am rapidly getting used to PhotoshopCC, and think it's the wave of the future for photographers. All the images were initially processed in Camera Raw 8. I have a plugin called Metaraw 3 from The Plugin Site, which allows Camera Raw to be run as a Photoshop filter after other work is done. That enabled me to bring out the texture and details in the tree bark instead of having it appear only as a silhouette. I recommend this software, even though there are other ways to do this kind of thing in PhotoshopCC. It's the easiest way, and it's not very expensive.

For reasons of no consequence, I pulled from their boxes my most successful (satisfying) fifty prints. The first lesson I learned was that most of the prints had one thing in common: at the time of shooting or when first examining the contacts, I would have never have imagined they would later become "selected" images. It often took years before their value, to me, became apparent.

This worries me. I now shoot exclusively with a digital camera, which necessitates rigorous editing either in the camera or at the downloading stage. If this selection process had been necessary with film, most of the fifty prints would not have existed.




